

the village-based farmer to farmer extension program where skilled women farmers share their experiences and knowledge in farming with other members of the community. This program is funded by the Oxfam International PNG through VfC. The program builds the capacities of the Extension Workers covering on all aspects of vegetable production and marketing.

Anna as an extension worker is providing support to approximately 30 farmers in vegetable growing and marketing.

She has a vegetable farm of chinese cabbages, beans, spring onions, cucumbers and carrots which she sells at Kudjip market. She also has a piggery.

She further attended trainings on gender, cooking, fish and pig farming.

She is an active member of the Kugar Women Farmers Group and has been instrumental in building the Community Training Centre.

Her role as an Extension Worker has benefited herself, her family and her community.

- 3. Women's Economical Empowerment (WEEP)
- 4. Women's Peace and Security.

The WEEP Program has four sub components.

- Skills Training
- Extension Program
- Savings Club
- Linkage & Sharing of information

The program aims to empower rural women economically to improve their lives, their status and the ability to overcome financial burdens within their families.

The focus of the training is on family team building through financial literacy, improve savings, banking skills and agricultural planning techniques and implementation.

The WEEP program has two (2) staff who are working with the Extension Workers, VCE and WHRD to implement the activities of the program.
